


WITNESSES FOR A HOPE-FILLED FUTURE



FROM THE HEART OF SISTER IDA



Do we have hope today? In the beginning of the Gospel of Luke, when Jesus is born, there is great hope, great rejoicing. Those who came to see Him in the manger were filled with hope and joy.

Later, in the temple, the old man, Simeon, has his hope fulfilled. It is the same with Anna, the prophetess.

This is the same Jesus we have today. At the end of Luke's Gospel, two of Jesus' disciples are walking to Emmaus. They are talking about hope. They say, "We had hoped ... "They speak of hope as past; their hope is over.

A stranger joins them and walks with them and asks about their sadness. They let him know that they had hopes, expectations: "Now everything is gone, our expectations are crushed." Does that remind you of today - that sense of the absence of God? We remember times when He was so present, and now perhaps we are at that stage where we say, "I wish my hopes had been fulfilled." Hope turns to despair, to desperation. When we start speaking about hope in the past tense, somehow or other we do not notice Jesus. He becomes a stranger to us.

Life is hard, we are not in control of some situations. Jesus did not separate himself from this real world. He took it all upon Himself. To us, His followers, He says: "I will help you through. I am not going to save you from pain, or difficulties, or sorrows, but I will be with you." The minute we are kind, as these two men were kind to this stranger on the road, inviting him to their table, we become companions. We are not just walking sideby-side, but really com-pane, breaking "bread together", eating bread together. Then they recognize Jesus, He becomes part of them, hope is back, their hearts are burning with joy. All of a sudden, everything becomes clear!

This is our life too. We are not saved from the difficulties of this life, but we have hope, we have Jesus, and He is walking by our side.

and the whole world." Last Easter we realized that our Sisters who entered the Community after 1983, did not have this blessed pilgrimage experience with Sister Ida. We sincerely believe that it is due to the Holy Spirit and Sister Ida's inspiration that we looked into the feasibility of making another such sacred pilgrimage!

We are most grateful to our benefactors who are making this pilgrimage possible. So the plan is underway! We will live simply, being hosted by religious communities, and will travel on foot and public transportation, buying our food along the way. This sacred pilgrimage will contribute greatly to the formation and education of our novice, temporary professed, and finally professed Sisters as we live and experience the land where Our Lord was born and lived, and where His Church was founded and established in Rome.

We will leave on May 28, and return June 13, in time to carry on our summer apostolic activities. We ask your prayers for our safety, and of course, carry you and your intentions in our hearts to the holy places.


