


IN UNION WITH OUR SHEPHERD

There is no one more charming than Jesus Christ. He is most human, not in the sense of having weaknesses and defects, but in the sense of understanding and loving human nature. He is real God and real man. He has a real Heart with real emotions, real sentiments of love.

Love makes it easy. God never misses the good we do. No matter how small, He sees and appreciates all that we do out of love for Him.


"BORDERLESS" CATECHESIS IN HUNGARY

Sister Michelle wrote recently from Budapest: "A Peruvian Verbum Dei Sister who is in my Hungarian language class, gives instructions to a Catholic Spanish-speaking group every Saturday. The people in her group live here in Budapest but come from South America and Spain.

She asked me if our Community had anything to help catechists, because she noticed that there was always a certain format I followed whenever I gave a presentation in class.

We gave her our Spanish DVD on "How to be a Dynamic and Effective Catechist" which she thoroughly enjoyed! This year there are children in her group who need Sacramental preparation, so we gave her a copy of our recently published book, *Catechist Companion* in Spanish, and she was delighted! She is having 3 young catechists watch the DVD with her, and then she gives them the lessons from the *Catechist Companion*.

God is amazing and delightful, He is reaching Spanish-speaking children here in Hungary through Sister Ida's charism!"


