The joy of the Resurrection must be part of our lives. The world can look at John Paul II and believe him. He is a Resurrection person. Our Sisters in Hungary were able to enthusiastically represent our community at the canonization of St. John XXIII and St. John Paul II. They had a blessed visit with Cardinal Raymond Burke, (above) our former Archbishop in St. Louis. He sent his blessing and prayers to all of us.

A holy place where our Sisters prayed for us and our friends was the historic private chapel of St. Paul of the Cross, founder of the Passionist Fathers; and it was the place where St. John XXIII practiced celebrating Mass before he was ordained!
