When our foundress, Sister Ida Peterfy, and our Sisters escaped through the Iron Curtain in 1949, they had no idea when our Lord would lead them back to Hungary. Sister Ida sought the opportunity to return and in 1992, sent Sister Eva Batta, Sister Judith Fogassy and Sister Shannon Stafford to reestablish the Society Devoted to the Sacred Heart in Hungary.

This past September, a Mass of Thanksgiving was celebrated at the Immaculate Heart of Mary Church in Budapest, the parish which welcomed the Sisters 25 years ago. The main presider of the Liturgy was Cardinal Péter Erdő, Archbishop of Esztergom -Budapest, also Bishop György Udvardy, Bishop István Katona and many priest friends who joined the celebration with families, friends, benefactors of the Sisters and local parishioners. Sister Mary Tomasella, our Superior General, and Sister Elizabeth Normanly, Council Member, flew to Hungary for this celebration, bringing all of the Sisters with them in spirit and in prayer.

The children come to class weekly, eager to learn about Jesus. Throughout the years, we have also taught some of their parents and grandparents. God has given a most precious gift, two vocations from the parish to our Society, Sister Martha Muñoz and Sister Guadalupe Rodriguez. From the Heart of Servant of God Sister Ida

"It is not just what we say but who we are that preaches to the people and is the source of apostolic action. We are being sent on a mission. Jesus said, "I send you." (Jn 20:21). Being sent on a mission is not a work we assume on our own. Apostolate is not just a private enterprise, such that I have a good idea and on my own I assume it and I am successful or unsuccessful in it. No! It is a commission from Christ.

Actually, in God's providence, mine was not a vocation to teach little children catechism; it was not my idealistic desire or wish. My call was the love of Our Lord. This may sound simplistic or overly general, but I do want to express it in simple words and concepts: If you love someone, you love those who belong to him and you want them all to know the person whom you love. This is what led me to teaching religion. My first call and first desire was that more and more people would know Our Lord on a deeply personal level, with an interior knowledge. This is the core of our teaching method, this was the origin of the 5-step Method of Illustrated Explanations.

The origin of this method was a personal commitment to the Lord, or in other words, the realization that He is personally involved in my life, He knows me by my name, He loves me, I am unique and special to Him. It was this same vision and conviction that I wanted to convey to others, to children and adults alike. I was seeking to find a way.

The Spirit of God was generous with very practical inspirations, and soon I was able to develop the Five Steps that carry through every one of our catechetical lessons: 1. Attracting of Attention, 2. Illustrated Explanation, 3. Correlation With Life, 4. Weekly Practice, 5. Review and Conclusion. What is so exciting about the Method is that it really was a gift of God in times when you had to sweat out the truth in such a way that it would be understandable, not heavy, and focus on the essence, reaching those who never heard about God or might not have that many chances to hear about Him again.

Our apostolic life is much more than what we can humanly do. If you want to bring forth lasting fruit, you have to be connected to the source and know that it is through His power that you are doing what you are doing; and the results are also my work and His work combined. This is our joy and our greatest gift – we are doing what we are doing through the power of Him who loves us and who incorporated us into His own life."

What attracted her to the Society was "the interaction of the Sisters with one another and their interaction with the youth and children". Her vocation was fostered through her contact with our Sisters, through "Sacred Heart Kids' Club, Camps, youth group and Holy Hours with the Sisters." Sister Audrey entered the Novitiate in 1997 and professed perpetual vows in 2006.

Sister Sophia was 15 when she met our Sisters who established their convent at her parish. She was very involved in serving her parish community in various ways including choir, scouting, pastoral council and also our Sisters' family catechesis, RCIA, Confirmation preparation and Family Camps. God's personal love grew in her heart deeper and stronger through daily Mass, Eucharistic adoration, spiritual direction, community service, personal sharing with the Sacred Heart Sisters, and love for the Catholic Church where she worked until she entered.

Sister Ines was 13 when she first thought of a Call to Religious Life. She knew the Sacred Heart Sisters, who lived in her parish in Budapest. She came to really know the Sisters through the summer camps that the Sisters led. She said, "I helped with Confirmation classes & R.C.I.A., summer camps and more. I remember Sister Eva telling a Gospel story as if it would have happened just around the corner - I wanted to know God the same way and be that close to Him. I made a final decision to enter the Society Devoted to the Sacred Heart during a prayer on a Girls' Camp counselors' weekend."

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
